ORIGINS OF THE FEAST

The Feast of Mount Carmel dates its origins back to Old Testament times of the Bible. It was at Mount Carmel, in the Holy Land, that the Prophet Elias (Elijah) recorded his victory against the priests of Baal. Baal's priests tried in vain to light their sacrificial fires. Elias poured water on his altar to drench his offerings and prayed to God to light his oblations. Fire came from heaven and consumed the offerings, water, and altar stone itself.

In early Christian times, hermits gathered to live in the Eastern monastic tradition at Mount Carmel. They met together occasionally for prayer, at a chapel they dedicated to Our Lady. This became the Lady of Mount Carmel. Turmoil in the Holy Land and the Muslim invaders scattered the hermits. They were forced to travel to the cities of southern Europe. Here, not having the solitude of the mountain, their rule was adapted to more of a cenobite monk existence. They spread throughout the western world. Our Lady appeared to St. Simon Stock, to whom She gave the brown scapular, and the graces of the Sabbatine Privilege. The Sabbatine Privilege, grants the wearer of the scapular, who follows the requirements of the Office of the Blessed Virgin, and chastity according to their station in life, release from time in Purgatory.

This devotion took special hold in southern Italy. When immigrants began to live in East Harlem they brought their love of the Lady of Mount Carmel with them. In 1884, they build the Shrine Church. In 1904, following the investigations began by Pope Leo XIII, Pope St. Pius X ordered the statue venerated at the Shrine, be solemnly crowned, in recognition of the favors granted at this Shrine. Thousands, from all communities of people, from all over the world still come here each July to pray, to thank the Blessed Mother, to receive the indulgences, or to ask for an intercession. Truly this Feast is blest.
